


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The Kellin Foundation's mission is to strengthen resilience among children, families, adults and communities through trauma-informed behavioral health services focused on prevention, treatment, and healing.

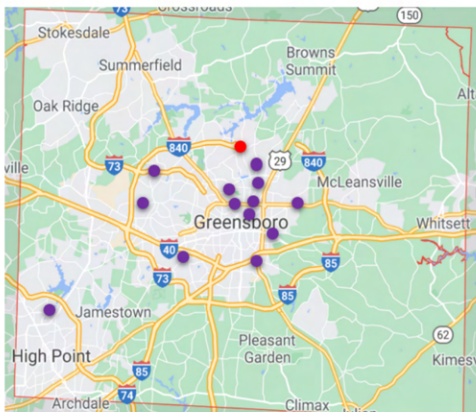

A LEGACY OF RESILIENCE

Mental Health Greensboro and Kellin Foundation Merger

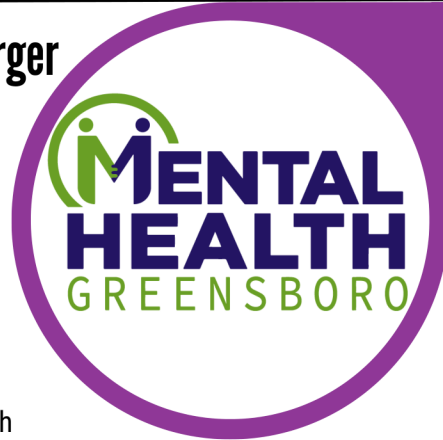
In April of 2022, Kellin Foundation merged services with one of Greensboro's longest operating non-profits, Mental Health Greensboro. Today we proudly carry on the legacy the 82 year old institution initiated.


Established in 1940 as the Mental Health Hygiene Society, the organization's original goal was to bring a psychiatric clinic to our community. In the first year, foreshadowing what would become to be known as the Compeer program in the 1990s, the Society held social activities, served as a network of support and compassion for people with with mental illness and began an annual holiday gift drive for hospitalized psychiatric patients-- a tradition that continues.

In 1951, in partnership with the head of Guilford County Health, Dr. Everett Hewes Ellinwood who vocalized the connection between physical and emotional health, the county's first mental health clinic was established. When the clinic became a service of the Guilford County Health Department in 1952, the Society began its long crusade as a strong advocate for understanding, education, and fairness in behavioral health treatment.

During the 1960s, the Society worked to establish a psychiatric unit at the Moses Cone Hospital, an endeavor that produced a longstanding partnership with the Cone Health family. Kellin Foundation is committed to maintaining this deep rooted connection. We pledge to continue to enhance the peer support services inherited in our merger that are currently implemented within the Cone Health system at the Guilford County Behavioral Health Center.

In 1977 the Society changed its name to the Mental Health Association in Greensboro and during that decade expanded its focus to developing communication channels between other agencies to better serve the mentally ill. Kellin Foundation relies daily on the same model of community communication in our service navigation program that helps clients maneuver a large web of community services and calm the anxieties that bureaucracy and paperwork bring. Our model helps clients obtain the behavioral health, housing, food, or bill assistance they need, giving them a chance to breathe...a practice that does wonders for one's resilience. Mental Health Greensboro recognized early on the importance of working within the community to help people get the services they need and Kellin Foundation is honored to uphold that long tradition of community engagement and to welcome that lasting system of care into our folds.





In the 1980s and '90s Mental Health Association of Greensboro was a well established presence in the community and developed significant programming to address the needs of the community. Family-to-Family provided weekly support groups to families. Gate House became a drop in center for people in the community in need of mental health support. Compeer, a program designed to support wellness and recovery through activities that give participants a chance to relax, engage and socialize was also developed in this era, and still lives on as programming at the Kellin Foundation today. Over the continuing years The Mental Health Association developed a range of support groups, job training programs, a referral service, community based mental health workshops, educational workshops for behavioral health , providers, a curriculum of wellness classes, and peer support services and training. Many of the programs the organization developed over its eighty-two years of service became permanent programming for other service agencies, and now live on at the Kellin Foundation as well.

In late 2018 the non-profit once again changed its name and was reincarnated as Mental Health Greensboro, the area's only dedicated peer support recovery organization. Mental Health Greensboro extended its focus on advocacy, provided free evidence-based recovery education, training, information and services to individuals and the community.

Mental Health Greensboro advanced mental wellness in our community for eighty-two years through leadership, education, community partnerships and direct services. The organization was a resilient mental health resource and over the course of its existence built a community of people whose lives were touched by recovery. Mental Health Greensboro (MHG) established its local legacy by assisting thousands of individuals manage their symptoms, stay in recovery, rebuild relationships, and pursue life goals. The leadership, staff and board members involved in the continuation of care that Mental Health Greensboro provided are to be commended for their empathy, generosity and dedication to improving lives. The Kellin Foundation is proud to uphold Mental Health Greensboro's mission to advance mental wellness and together we are making a difference.

Since April of 2022, the Kellin Foundation has continued to offer MHG's wellness classes, peer support sessions, support groups and has expanded MHG's training programs locally. The combined efforts and partnership of Mental Health Greensboro's long standing community and Kellin Foundation's ever blossoming base of supporters will allow us to continue to grow services, continue to help those who otherwise may not be able to afford behavioral health services, expand our reach to those in the community and the state, and honor the resilient tradition of care that Mental Health Greensboro chartered a lifetime ago.

FUTURE FUND 10

PRIZE WINNING PITCH

The force was with the Kellin Foundation on the evening of May 4th at Future Fund 10, non-profit Future Fund of Greensboro's innovative philanthropic pitch competition. The annual event is a fantastic endeavor that allows ten non-profits a three minute spotlight on the Carolina Theater stage to pitch reasons why their organization should be chosen by the audience to be awarded part of the \$45,000 in grant funds up for grabs. Kellin Foundation was one of the ten non-profits selected from a slew of applicants as a finalist for Future Fund 10. As a finalist Kellin Foundation received pro-bono advice from world class consultants and our director, Dr. Kelly Graves, attended a two day intensive workshop focused on the art of persuasive presentation.



The night commenced with a reception of drinks and appetizers. The Carolina Theater was alive with over five hundred people in attendance. After a warm welcome from former and current Future Fund leaders, the pitch competition began. Each pitch pulled at the heartstrings of a compassionate and captive audience. One non-profit needed grant money to help immigrants become settled. Another helped families on the path of self-sufficiency furnish their homes. Causes aiming to eliminate prejudice, address food insecurity, raise awareness of educational and societal inequities, and empower youth were all represented by the non-profit finalists.

Dr. Graves' pitch was heartfelt and emotional. She walked the stage in her purple dress and spoke of her youth and how there was no excitement of a snow day off from school because there would be no escape from the alcohol fueled fights she witnessed between her parents or the abuse she endured from them. She spoke of her loss of emotion and the numbness she experienced as an adult and how she weathered storms by pouring herself into her work in academia, a coping mechanism she did not recognize until later. She spoke of how for decades she ignored the voice in her head telling her to make a change in her life and how the death of several close friends reminded her that time waits for no one. She quit her job as a tenured professor and began the Kellin Foundation. Dr. Graves spoke of the work Kellin Foundation does, providing evidence based behavioral health services to over 12,000 individuals battling their own storms and who cannot afford services. "Right now tonight, due to the demand, there are children on our waiting list living in violence. Teens who want to end their life, and adults battling addiction, depression, anxiety. Please don't make them wait." She pointed to the audience, "Tonight, you and you can be a storm buster. Hope and healing are waiting when the snow melts." She walked out of the spotlight to vivacious applause.

Upon conclusion of the competition, when all non-profit finalists had made their pitches, the audience picked the four pitches that moved them the most. The results proved to be a landslide and in the end, it was Dr. Graves' speech for the Kellin Foundation that was chosen decisively as the grand prize winner of twenty thousand dollars! The entire Kellin team hooped and hollered from the audience and celebrated the victory, proud of their community work, and happy to be recognized for the difference they make at the Kellin Foundation. Future Fund 10 was an incredible highlight and the cherry on top of a year of growth and change.

THE ART OF CHANGING LIVES



"Kyle"

Middle school can be tough. Poor grades, fights at school, lashing out at home and not following rules were issues making these critical years even more difficult for Kyle. At a loss for how to help, Kyle's grandparents reached out to the Kellin Foundation. At Kellin, Kyle was able to safely explore his sadness, anger, and grief towards his biological parents who were unable to provide for him. He learned how to become aware of his feelings and manage and express them in healthy ways. He learned how to communicate effectively, learned skills to engage in healthy conflict resolution and how to challenge unhelpful thoughts to improve his mood and behave in ways he felt proud of. After treatment, Kyle's relationships at school got better. There were no more fights. His grades improved and he felt proud of himself. He began following the rules at home more. Kyle's grandparents reported a complete turnaround in his behaviors, celebrated an improved relationship with him, and are very thankful for Kellin's services that helped their grandson overcome the internal turmoil that was fueling his challenging behaviors.

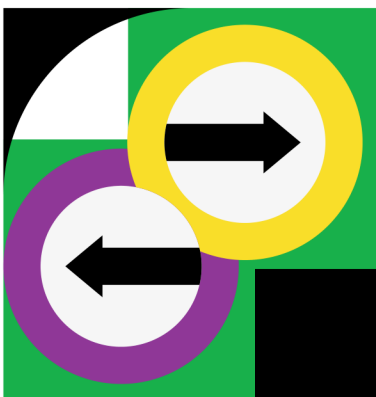
"Jennifer"

Jennifer struggled with an addiction to alcohol. She attended our Wellness Recovery Action Plan (WRAP) class this year and developed a series of tools to help her maintain her sobriety. In addition to the wellness tools she's learned, she utilizes the support groups at Kellin Foundation. Jennifer is now pursuing her Peer Support Specialist Certification and always encourages peers by sharing her wellness tools and her experiences. Kellin Foundation is grateful for such a wonderful example of a peer working recovery.

"Adam"

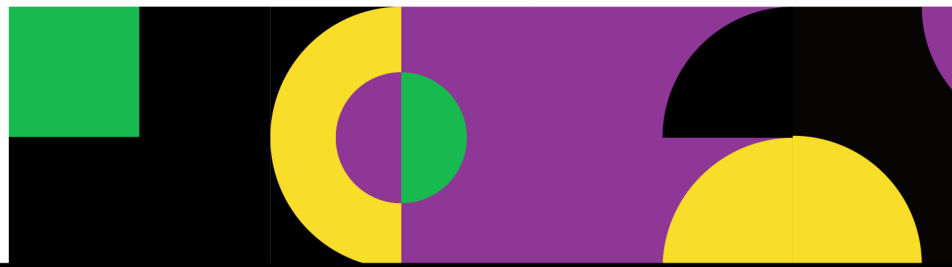
Adam came to Kellin with a diagnosis of Schizophrenia that impacted his ability to work and connect with others. He struggled with self-isolation, drastic changes in behaviors, getting regular sleep and other negative symptoms. Over the course of therapy at Kellin Foundation, Adam developed the ability to identify triggers of his negative symptoms, which he was unable to do before. Adam opened up to pushing himself to make more connections with new people as well as developing deeper connections with more positive relationships that already existed. He now has more social support and is working to find employment now that he is better able to cope with his symptoms.

"Angel"



Angel, a young teenager, reported feelings of sadness, anxiety and depression. She had experienced bullying at a previous school and this negative experience was compounded by the isolation that COVID-19 created. In school again, Angel began experiencing panic attacks, insomnia, and low self-esteem. Through therapy at Kellin she was able to safely explore her past experiences, explore and affirm her identity, experience healthy connection, learn ways to manage her anxiety, increase self-care behaviors, and communicate effectively within her current relationships. After treatment, Angel reported feeling more confident, less anxious, empowered, and was using what she had learned in therapy to support her friends and family.

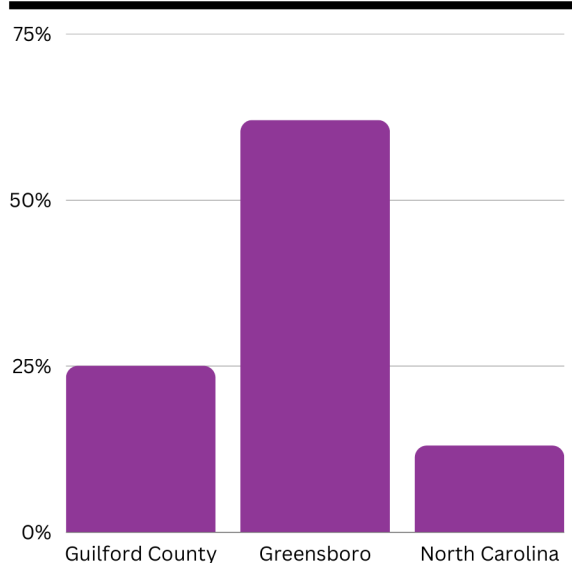


IN THE COMMUNITY

Kellin Foundation expanded its community impact on the national, state, and local levels in 2022. To highlight, in August we were honored to have our Deputy Director, Lylan Wingfield, present at the annual national conference for the National Child Traumatic Stress Network in Baltimore. The presentation focused on Military Informed Trauma Informed (MITI) Kids and the Kellin Foundation's partnership with UCLA/NCTSN in the pilot training for this initiative. Lylan presented alongside Dr. Gregory Leskin and family partners from the Elizabeth Dole Foundation on the importance of military informed services for children and families of military and veteran affiliated families.

Kellin Foundation along with our Resilient Guilford network collaborated with Blue Cross Blue Shield and six other North Carolina counties in the PACES CONNECTION network to in Healthy Blue, an innovative pilot program to improve health in the foster care community. Children in foster care have higher rates of adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) than most children. The Healthy Blue program advocates building on existing community connections to strengthen relationships among children, families and caregivers. The work centers on providing proven tools for lowering stress, building resilience, and in bringing some positive childhood experiences to children and families in the foster community. Kellin Foundation is dedicated to create healthy, compassionate communities that are more supportive of foster families and teaching resiliency skills to those in the affected community.

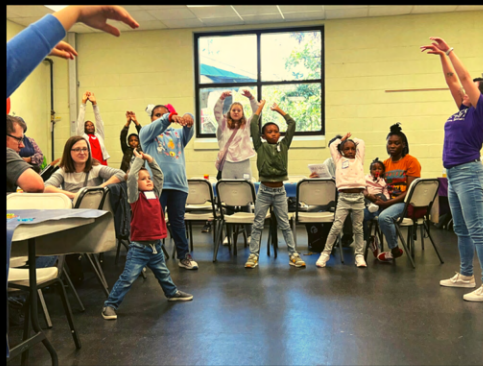

We painted so many pumpkins with so many kids at Junior League of Greensboro's annual Touch-A-Truck and had a great time watching children's creativity unfold before our eyes as pumpkins transformed. To top off a sensational year Kellin Kids hooped and hollered at our holiday toy drive watching the Greensboro Swarm basketball game thanks to our wonderful friends at Junior League. We look forward to continuing our partnership with local organizations and growing our Kellin Kids program in 2023!

Women To Women Winners

Kellin Foundation was recognized for contributions to our community by Women to Women of Greensboro, a grant making endowment invested in changing the lives of in need or at-risk women and girls. We were honored to receive a \$25,000 grant from Women to Women in October of 2022.

Funding from Women to Women will allow Kellin Foundation to ensure that two hundred women and girls do not fall through the cracks, and are able to not only manage their stress, but thrive. Our project serves as a safety net/gap filler so that 200 women don't fall through the cracks because of a lack of ability to pay.

We celebrate receiving this trust and validation from a community partner that is working to improve lives through various facets and causes.

SERVICE SPOTLIGHT

RESILIENCE IN MOTION

Parent-Child Interactive Therapy

Since 1917 The Baker Center for Children and Families, a Harvard Medical School affiliate has dedicated itself to improving the lives of children whose mental health problems threaten to limit their potential. It is the oldest child mental health organization in New England and a national leader in the field of children's mental health. The Kellin Foundation is honored to be chosen by The Baker Center to participate in a National Child Traumatic Stress Network (NCTSN) Parent Child Interactive Therapy (PCIT) learning collaborative that began in late 2022.



Our Kellin Crew was treated to a trip to Boston, Massachusetts in early December to be trained in PCIT. PCIT is an evidence based family-centered treatment approach for children with disruptive behaviors and children who have been abused or have experienced trauma. PCIT consists of weekly sessions in which the therapist observes and works with child and caregivers together to improve behavior and reduce parenting stress. Relative to standard treatment alternatives, PCIT achieves better results for youth and families typically served in community settings. Kellin Foundation implemented PCIT into our practice in mid-December and are excited to continue our learning collaborative and sustain this program.

Now Serving ALL of North Carolina

Fall of 2022 brought with it an opportunity to expand Kellin Foundation's reach beyond Guilford County. In partnership with the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services Kellin Foundation implemented a new program, SBIRT. The primary goal of SBIRT (Screening, Brief Intervention, Referral Treatment) is to have early identification of adolescent substance use and to provide the most appropriate intervention and/or treatment service. We aim to serve 500 people in the time span of this project through SBIRT implementation and community outreach. Kellin Foundation is now offering in-person and telehealth SBIRT services to all youth ages 12-17 in North Carolina to assist them in getting the help they need to overcome substance use.

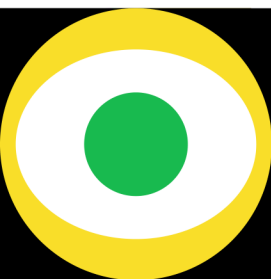

PROJECT SUMMARY

Below you will find a brief description of the service navigation, peer support, clinical services and specialty clinics Kellin Foundation provided in 2022.

- **Child Response Initiative (CRI):** Our service navigation initiative with a primary focus on children and families (but adults also can be referred).
- **Integrated Behavioral Health Program (United Way of Greater Greensboro):** Implemented peer support and clinical services for those living in poverty
- **Compeer:** Implementation of trauma-informed, recovery-oriented peer support services.
- **SBIRT (Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment):** Implementation of evidence-based brief intervention aimed at preventing and treatment substance use.
- **Project NIA:** Implementation of training and capacity building to increase cultural awareness and responsiveness as well as serve BIPOC adolescents who otherwise would not have access to care.
- **The Treehouse (NCTSN - National Child Traumatic Stress Network):** Implementation of trauma-informed assessment and treatment services for individuals 0-18.
- **Greensboro HEALS (Healing and Empowering All Survivors):** Implementation of adult-focused services using trauma-informed framework to address co-occurring mental health and substance use concerns.
- **OVC Seeds of Hope:** Implementation of trauma-informed services to address the impact of addiction on youth and families.
- **Inspire:** Implementation of trauma-informed services to adult victims, with a particular focus on domestic violence.
- **Women to Women:** Implementation of services for those girls and women who otherwise do not fall in one of our target populations and otherwise would not have access to care.
- **Family Success Center:** Implementation of peer support services for those living in poverty.

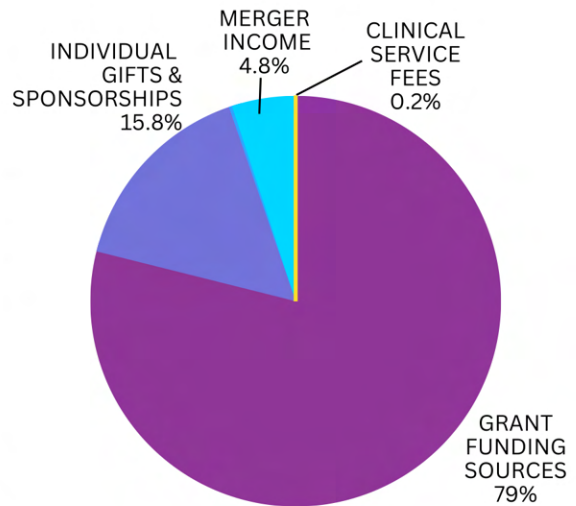
FINANCES

IN FOCUS

Kellin Foundation had its best fiscal year yet in 2022! Revenue from individual gifts, sponsorships, and grants increased 22% while net income grew 27% ! The merger with Mental Health Greensboro increased Kellin's expenses by 21% over 2021. Considering the amount of consulting fees, auxiliary services (legal, auditing, document shredding!) and new staff we brought on, that number is relatively low. The majority of of Kellin's expenses were related to pay and benefits for our highly-qualified staff (82.1%) followed by auxiliary services needed to complete the merger (4.9%) and facility rent (3.4%).

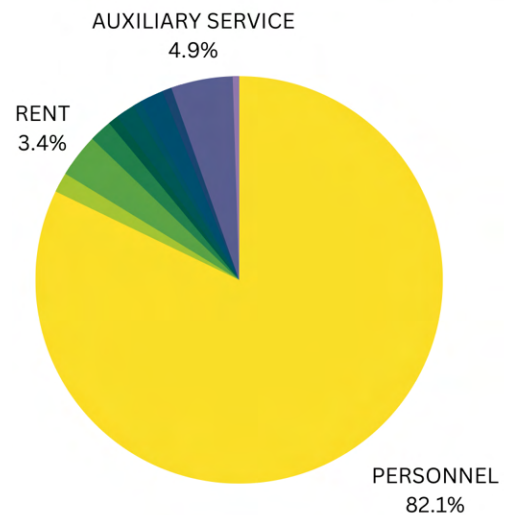
